


# Second Grade Project Based Learning



# Pittsford Elementary Interscholastic Chess Tournament

Allen Creek hosted students from all five Pittsford elementary schools for an interscholastic chess tournament in March, taking advantage of the Tuesday half-day for hours of play. The Rochester Chess Center awarded prizes for top players in each grade, top players in each section (K-2 and 3-5), and top school teams in each section and overall K-5. Allen Creek took home the top trophy as "Tournament K-5 Champion," with many of our students also earning individual medals and trophies. This friendly competition was also just fun: One participant reported that it was the most fun he had EVER had! Thank you to Wegmans for donating cupcakes to our snack spread, and an even bigger thank you to Valentina Zanardi and Silas Patel, ACE Chess Club Co-chairs, for pulling off what we hope is the first of many annual tournaments!





#### Art Club

ACE's student artists produced some fantastic pieces this spring. Surrealist Rene Magritte's The Return and Eric Carle's Nonsense Show served as inspiration for our first K-2 project. Students created tissue paper nighttime skies that became the backdrops for daytime-colored bird silhouettes. Early finishers used pattern blocks to create a variety of birds or gorgeous original mosaics. We switched gears with more realistic looking bowls of alphabet soup for a second project. Sid Hoff's alphabet doodles had students creating more ABC-inspired art, too. Students in grade 3-5 focused on portraits, from egg-carton animal faces to 3-D paper sculpture self-portraits to Roy Lichtenstein-esque pop art faces. We also played with poses and body language as we "sculpted" foil action figures inspired by Alberto Giacometti. Thank you to volunteer instructor Lindsay Lau who made a second K-2 section possible and to all the adult volunteers who helped each week!








#### 4th Grade Stem Club

Our high school STEM instructor Feroze Ali returned for a final lesson on 3-D printing this March. Feroze impressed students with his personal 3-D printer that he refurbished after purchasing it second-hand. He discussed examples of 3-D printed items, from chicken nuggets to homes, and student Eddie Popp played a 3-D printed electric guitar he built with his dad, showcasing another application for the technology. Each fourth grader then received a kit of 3-D printed model car parts to assemble. Students personalized their kit cars and shared their designs. #### Creative Movement and Latin Dance

Students in grades K-2 learned dance movements choreographed to various genres of Latin music in this new club offering. The choreography included use of various props such as batons, scarves, and ribbon wands. Students learned some Spanish, too! Shouts of "izquierda" and "derecha" had students moving left and right on command; synchronous counting all the way up to 20 echoed in the gym. Instructors Jessica Pereyra and Carlos Chediak's joyful energy was infectious with both the children and adult volunteers. A big thank you to Doria Rocchio, Marty Coddington, and Sarah Ozimek, who co-chaired this club, and to the adult volunteers who happily grooved right along with the kids each week!







# Yoga Club

Heidi Kaufman from PeaceFull Kids returned this May for four-weeks of yoga adventures with students in grades K-5. The classes combined traditional yoga poses with music, games, and movement and guided students to a place of quiet and relaxation at the end of their busy school days. Our flexible participants creatively made contact on the mat given limited body parts ("one hand, one knee, one foot" or "only your bum"—cue giggles!), transitioned through a sun salutation, mindfully inhaled and exhaled with a breathing ball, and contorted themselves into eagles, triangles, trees and more. # Lego Club

We had three sections of Lego Club this spring! Parent instructor John Roberts led our club for students in grades 3-5. Students eagerly worked on challenges, from tallest towers to foods to scenes for mini-figure mash-ups and more. John invited a Lego master builder one week to share some of his own creations and provide tips and tricks. Participants also got to screen some of Pure Imagination Studios' work for Lego. (This is John's company!) They recently made a Lego-themed music video for country music star Chris Stapleton. Students got movie and music video poster swag and got to see how a favorite toy can translate into a future career! John's gold star system and weekly prizes became legendary-something we adopted for our K-2 students who didn't go home empty handed. Blind-bag mini figures were fan favorites with grades K-5. While John set the bar high, Seana Rozo, Sarah Baker, and Kate Nearpass did an equally fantastic job with our two sections of Lego Club for grades K-2. Students partook in more creative challenges, mixing in team builds, themed builds, and free builds for four more weeks of fun. The MPR was transformed into a buffet of bricks! Thank you to the adult helpers who sorted through bin-fulls of bricks each week to find the perfect piece for our student builders to complete their visions and who sacrificed fingernails to break down all those creations at the end of each club!















### St. Patrick's Day STEAM

'Twas the night before St. Patrick's Day, and 36 hopeful children used their STEAM skills in hopes that the luck of the Irish would soon come their way! Students in grades K-2 designed elaborate leprechaun traps working with a variety of recycled materials and craft supplies. Their sneaky plans included welcoming signs, alluring rainbows, pots of gold, trap doors, slippery slides and more. I wonder how many heard their jingle bell alarms ring the next day?! Thank you to the many adult volunteers who made a cafeteria full of makers feel manageable!







#### Sap, Syrup & Sugar w/ GCV&M's Moveable Museum

Students explored the sweet history and science behind maple sugar and syrup production from early America to present-day commercial production with a visit from the Genesee Country Village and Museum during March's sugaring season. Museum educator Julie Lane taught students how to identify maple trees and introduced them to new vocabulary like "spile" and "firkin." Participants modeled a yoke and got to try their hand at "tapping" a tree with a bit brace hand drill and hammer. The lesson on how sap is turned into syrup and sugar was extra sweet since students enjoyed samples of both at the end of the class. Thank you to the adult volunteers who made it possible to offer two sessions.









#### Musical Theatre Club

The halls were alive with *The Sound of Music*! This club was an opportunity for students with all levels of experience to enjoy the elements of musical theater, including audition prep, theater games, singing, movement/dance, and scene work. Participants in grades 3-5 worked with instructor Laura Jean Diekmann on two scenes and two songs ("Do-Re-Mi" and "So Long, Farewell") from the musical, which they performed at a showcase on Allen Creek's stage for family and friends after their last class! # Arts & Sciences: Rocks & Minerals Club

Science Club met Art Club in this after-school program mash-up. Week one, RMSC instructor Mark Almakinder defined what makes a mineral versus a rock and then reviewed the three kinds of rocks—igneous, metamorphic, and sedimentary—with our student scientists in grades 3-5. During a hands-on lesson, students were given a collection of minerals and asked to identify the specimens using their observations about color, luster, streak test, and hardness. Even without actual diamonds for a full Mohs hardness scale test, students successfully identified their samples! The second week students closely observed geodes before creating their own warm or cool colored versions with construction paper, washable Crayola markers, Sharpies, tempera paint sticks, and watercolors paints. Colorful tube confetti "crystals" added a wonderful finishing touch to our agate-like art. Thank you to the adult volunteers—you rock!















#### Aerial Arts of Rochester

The circus stopped at Allen Creek! Six aerialists from Aerial Arts of Rochester took over gym classes for the last two days in May. Students challenged themselves during 40-minute workshops split between tumbling and hooping, with each class tailored to the grade level. Tumbling included a mix of the bear crawl, crab walk, pencil rolls, front rolls, back rolls, cart wheels, and handstands. Mr. Biondi even challenged himself to a backbend! Students paired up for partner acro-poses, too. They also learned new hula hoop tricks beyond just twirling it around their waists. They spun it on their arms, necks, and legs. They tossed them with partners. They learned to "walk the dog," used them like jump ropes, created hopscotch courses, and worked together to pass the hoops around a circle while holding hands. When asked by Mr. McAlpin and Mr. Novitsky if they surprised themselves with something new they were able to do, many students raised their hand at the end of the classes. After working on tumbling and hooping skills, students got to see these elements taken to the next level when the aerialist performed for them at two assemblies. The performers dangled 20 feet in the air from various apparatuses, including aerial silks, a hammock, a trapeze, and a sphere, showing off strength, flexibility, and artistry. Students cheered in delight as they were treated to routines filled with choreographed flips, spins, and drops. Thank you to Will D'Ovidio and Coaches Paxton, Miranda, Frances, Jess and Alexa from Aerial Arts of Rochester for a magical two days and to PTSA for funding this cultural arts enrichment opportunity! If any of your children want to run away with the circus, you may be able to convince them to settle for a summer camp at Aerial Arts of Rochester instead!
