# All the Colors We Are: The Story of How We Get Our Skin Color by Katie Kissinger, photog. by Chris Bohnhoff

All the Colors We Are is a bilingual nonfiction book that teaches children the scientific explanation of how skin color is determined. Skin color is determined by a combination of our parents and ancestors, the sun our skin is exposed to, and the amount of melanin in our skin. It's a genetic adaptation to a person's environment. Children are naturally curious about why people have different skin colors and this book helps to answer their questions while breaking down myths and stereotypes. It also helps children to develop positive self-esteem, self-acceptance, and respect for diversity.

#### **Family Discussion Ideas**

- People have different shades of skin but everyone's skin is a shade of the same color. What color is everyone's skin?
- Why do people have different skin tones?
- Melanin is a pigment that forms the tones of our skin. Where else can melanin be found?
- How do you feel about the color of your skin? Why do you feel that way?
- What were your thoughts and feelings while learning about how we get our skin color?
- Did anything in the book challenge what you thought you knew?
- Discuss where your child's ancestors are from and how that relates to the color of their skin.
