Between January and February, students will begin and complete the Reading Around a Problem Unit, where they learn about world problems and come up with potential solutions to those problems. Upon completion of a final project, some being in the form of posters while others are in the form of PowerPoints or Sway presentations, all fifth graders will begin the History (of the Western Hemisphere) Unit.




Students are continuing to steadily progress through the math curriculum. They will soon be moving out of decimals and into fractions. Math knowledge is continuing to be built upon the groundwork that was laid at the beginning of the year. Students will begin to work through a program called Front Row, where they go at their own personal pace and are directed to seek advice about particular problems from other students that are at the same level as them in the program. Some students may progress beyond algebra and move into coordinate geometry.

Fifth graders will finish their memoir units in the next two months and begin working on persuasive writing. F&P (Fountas & Pinnell) testing will also resume in January, when teachers test student reading levels to best help inform their instruction. All classes are working on different reading units at this point in time, but will finish their current unit and rotate partway through January and February as well.



The next two calendar months promise to be very busy and with a high intensity of academic learning. Students will have a lot of fun with concerts and clubs, while also being exposed to even more academic challenges. The midpoint in the school year is at the end of January and while that's hard to believe, the fifth graders are definitely moving in the right direction academically, socially, and emotionally. Keep up the great work girls and boys and you will continue to surprise even yourselves with how much you will learn and accomplish this year!

#### Helping Your Child Improve His/Her Reading Fluency

What is Fluency? Reading fluency is the ability to read a text easily. Reading fluency actually has four parts: accuracy, speed, expression, and comprehension. Each part is important, but no single part is enough on its own. A fluent reader is able to coordinate all four aspects of fluency.

Accuracy: Reading words correctly is a key to developing fluency. Children need to be able to read words easily without having to stop and decode them by sounding them out or breaking them into chunks.

Rate: When children read fluently, they read at an efficient rate. This means that they read quickly. Rate does not mean that children should read as fast as they possibly can.

**Expression**: Expression in fluency refers to the ability to read in a way that sounds like spoken language. This means that the child uses appropriate emotion to read aloud, pauses for periods and commas, and emphasizes important words. Expression also shows that the child understands what is being read.

<u>Comprehension</u>: Fluency is the bridge between being able to read (or decode) words and to comprehend or understand what is read. The real goal of reading fluency is to help children read a text with ease so they can focus on understanding what they read.

#### 10 Ways for Parents to Help Children Build Their Reading Fluency At Home...

- I. Repeated Readings: Reading and re-reading easy books is a great way to build your child's reading fluency.
- 2. Model Fluent Reading: Be sure to use expression in your reading. You can even use funny voices for dialogue as you read aloud to your child.
- 3. Echo Reading: You read a phrase, sentence, or paragraph aloud to model fluent reading. Your child then reads the same phrase, sentence, or paragraph afterwards, like an echo. Continue this pattern until you have read a book, story, or page of text with your child.
- 4. Read Aloud to Younger Siblings or Friends: Once your child is able to read a book fluently, ask him or her to read it aloud to another child.
- 5. Poetry and Nursery Rhymes: Take turns with your child reading a short poem or nursery rhyme until he or she can read it fluently.
- 6. Paired Reading: First, you will read a poem or short passage to your child. Then, you and your child will read the poem or passage together several times. Finally, have your child read the poem or passage to you.
- 7. Sight Words: Review until he or she knows these words automatically.
- 8. Comic Strips: Read a comic strip aloud, using expression. Then ask your child to read the comic strip aloud.
- 9. Have your child practice reading a text aloud while riding in the car or on the bus.
- 10. Set aside reading practice time every day. Even 5 minutes of reading fluency practice using any of the activities listed above will help to develop your child's reading fluency.

#### ASEP REVISED ATTENDANCE POLICY

Once your child is registered for an ASE program, you will receive an email from the program coordinator. You will be REQUIRED to respond to this email so that we can confirm your child's registration for the program.

Your child's enrollment in the ASE program will be communicated to the TRE administrative office by the PTSA. The main office clerical staff will communicate this information to your child's teacher.

Your child will be expected to attend the program days as scheduled. No daily permission slip will be necessary to attend the ASE program. A note or phone call to the Main Office will ONLY be required when your child is NOT planning to attend the ASE program on a specific day. The Main Office staff will need to know the manner in which your child will be going home that afternoon.
