Principal's Perspective

Dear Parents and School Community,



With the success of our annual Hour of Code events, we are in the process of building a *Makerspace* in our library to further cultivate student interest in Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Math (STEAM). For the past two and a half years, our library media specialist, Janah Autovino, has attended conferences, researched the idea and has been instrumental in bringing a vision to reality.

What is a Makerspace? The basis for this idea is rooted in the joy of discovery associated with tinkering and creating using a variety of materials, supplies and tools that are high-tech, low-tech and no-tech. It is a collaborative work space that provides for a hands-on experience for students to employ critical thinking skills, creativity and problem-solving strategies. While every Makerspace is unique, typical projects include computer coding, electronics, robotics, puzzles and crafts.



Using funding sources from a BOCES grant, our PTSA and the building budget, we have already purchased materials, supplies and technology and are currently putting the finishing touches on design features for the TRE Makers Space which will be located within our library. Stay tuned for more information.

TRE Library Diversity Audit

The Thornell Road Library has been undergoing some exciting changes this year! We are participating in a "Diversity Audit". What does this mean? We are looking at each book in our chapter book collection to audit (rate) the diversity of the main characters, on the basis of race, culture, nationality, gender, disability as well as other categories. The end result will provide data for the librarians to review and use to help increase the levels of diversity in future book purchases. We have been also making an effort to promote more diverse books through booktalks, during readalouds, bookclubs, and when suggesting books to students and teachers. Our hope is that our students see themselves reflected in the books we provide, as well as learn about people who are different from them.

There are a few key terms to know when thinking about diversity in children's literature:

Mirrors and Windows: Some books provide a *mirror*; they reflect a student's life experiences. Other books provide a *window* into the life experiences of people whose identities differ from their own.


Own Voices: This term began as a hashtag on Twitter (#ownvoices) and was used to denote books with diverse characters that are written by people who share those identities.

In the past few years, there has been a major shift in the children's book industry. Publishers are beginning to recognize the need to provide books by #ownvoices authors which feature characters who are diverse. An organization called We Need Diverse Books is "a non-profit and grassroots organization of children's book lovers that advocates essential changes in the publishing industry to produce and promote literature that reflects and honors the lives of all young people." Front Desk by Kelly Yang

When Mia Tang's parents find a new job managing the Calivista motel, it seems like the answer to their prayers: free housing and a stable, secure job, neither of which have come easy to the recent Chinese immigrants. Fifth-grader Mia takes pride in working the front desk and becomes fast friends with the weeklies, for whom the motel is a semi-permanent residence. But the motel's owner, Mr. Yao, is beyond mean—he's flat out racist—so Mia enters a writing contest to win their very own motel.(Gr 4and up)



When six students are chosen to participate in a weekly talk with no adults allowed, they discover that when they're together, it's safe to share the hopes and fears they have to hide from the rest of the world. (Gr. 5 and up)

When a young boy visits his grandfather, their lack of a common language leads to confusion, frustration, and silence. But as they sit down to draw together, something magical happens - with a shared love of art and storytelling, the two form a bond that goes beyond words. (Grade K-5)

Lola was just a baby when her family left the Island (Dominican Republic), so when she has to draw it for a school assignment, she asks her family, friends, and neighbors about their memories of her homeland . . . and in the process, comes up with a new way of understanding her own heritage" (Gr. 




