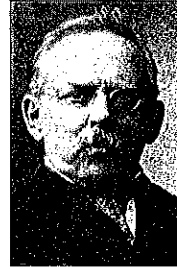
Muckraker: Jacob Riis

Medium: novels "The Jungle"

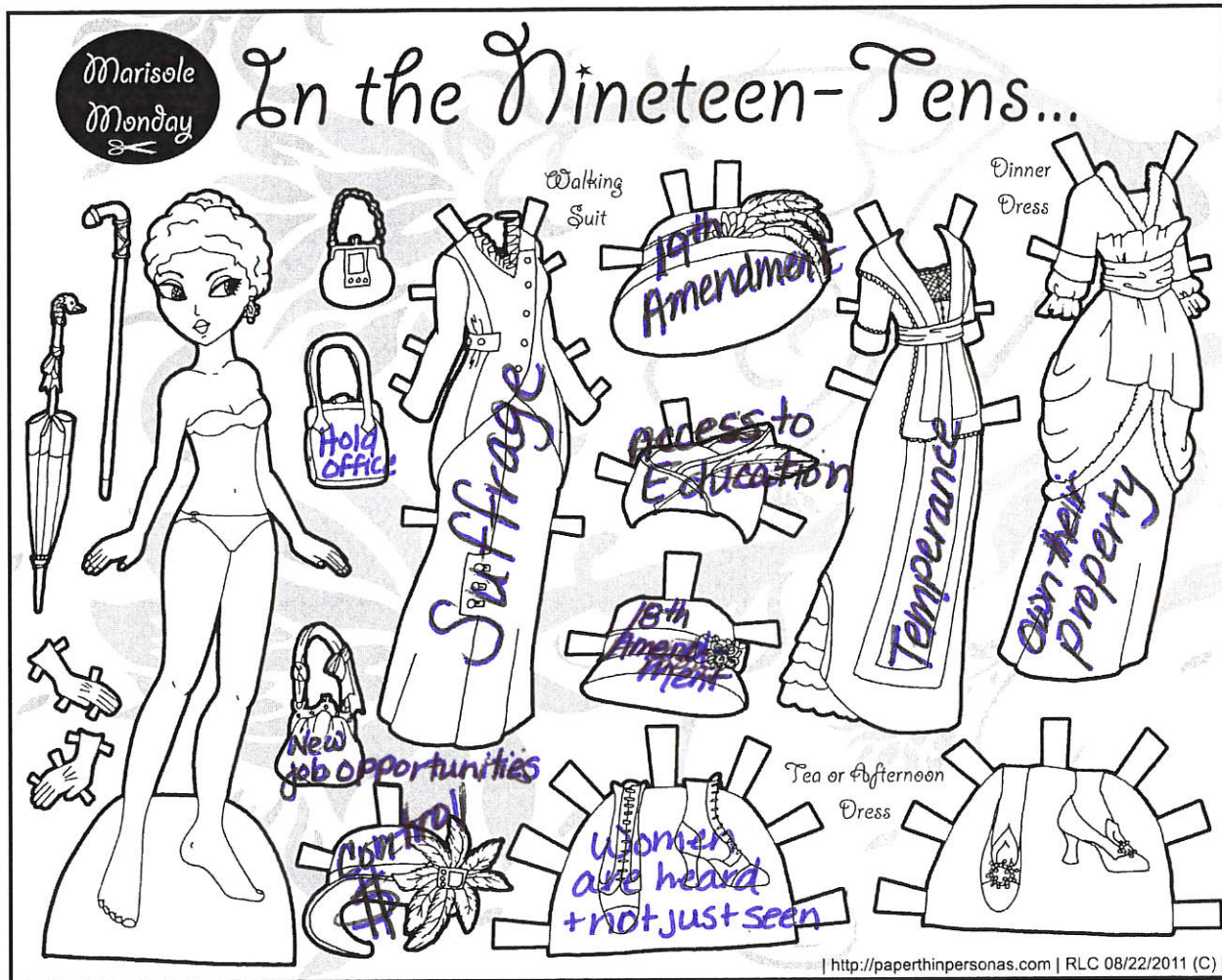
Target: Slaughterhouses + working conditions

Effect: (laws, actions, influences, etc.)

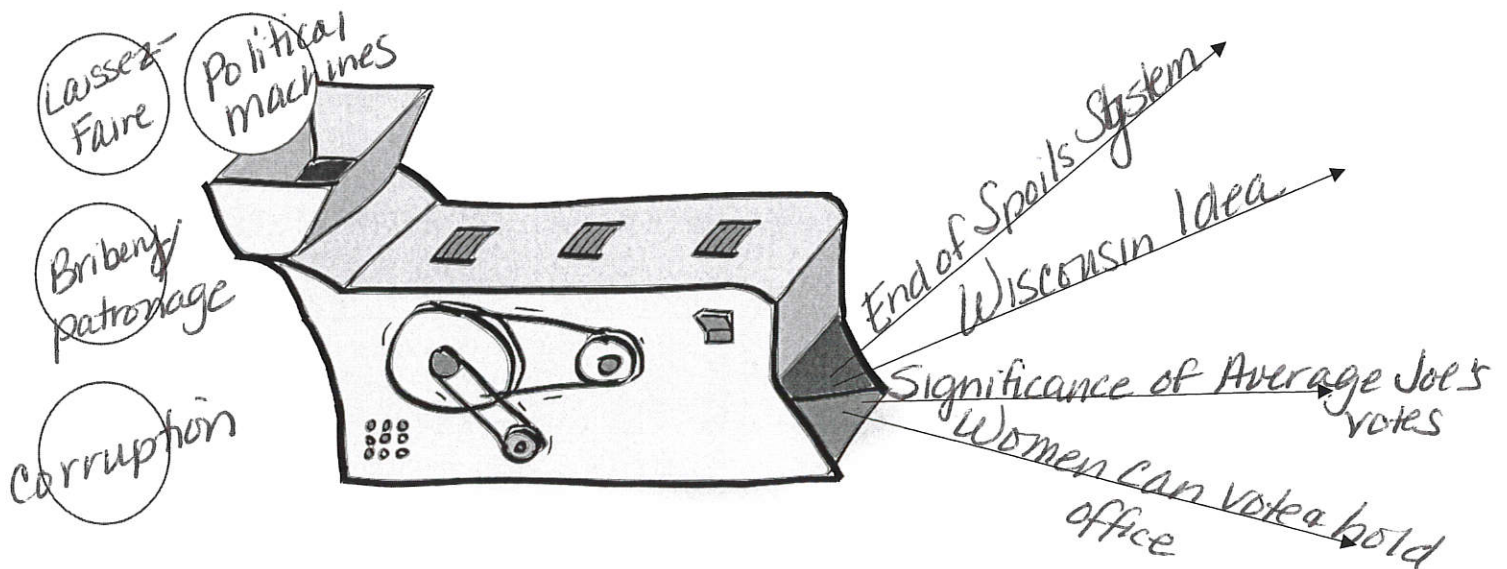
TR investigation, Pure Food + Drug Act, Meat Inspection Act, Food + Drug Administration

16th Amendment

Purpose: Collection of Income tax

Effect:

- Rich pay more fair share of taxes
- No dependence on excise tax on alcohol
- Prohibition: 18thA.

17th Amendment

Purpose: Direct election of Senators

Effect:

- End of Spoils System
- More qualified candidates get elected
- the people's voice + vote matter

18th Amendment Prohibition

Purpose:

Sale, consumption, transport, + production is illegal

Effect:

- Rise of Organized Crime (mobsters)
- Millions of Americans break law everyday
- Gov't spends millions trying to enforce
- Smuggling

*Repeal: April, 1933

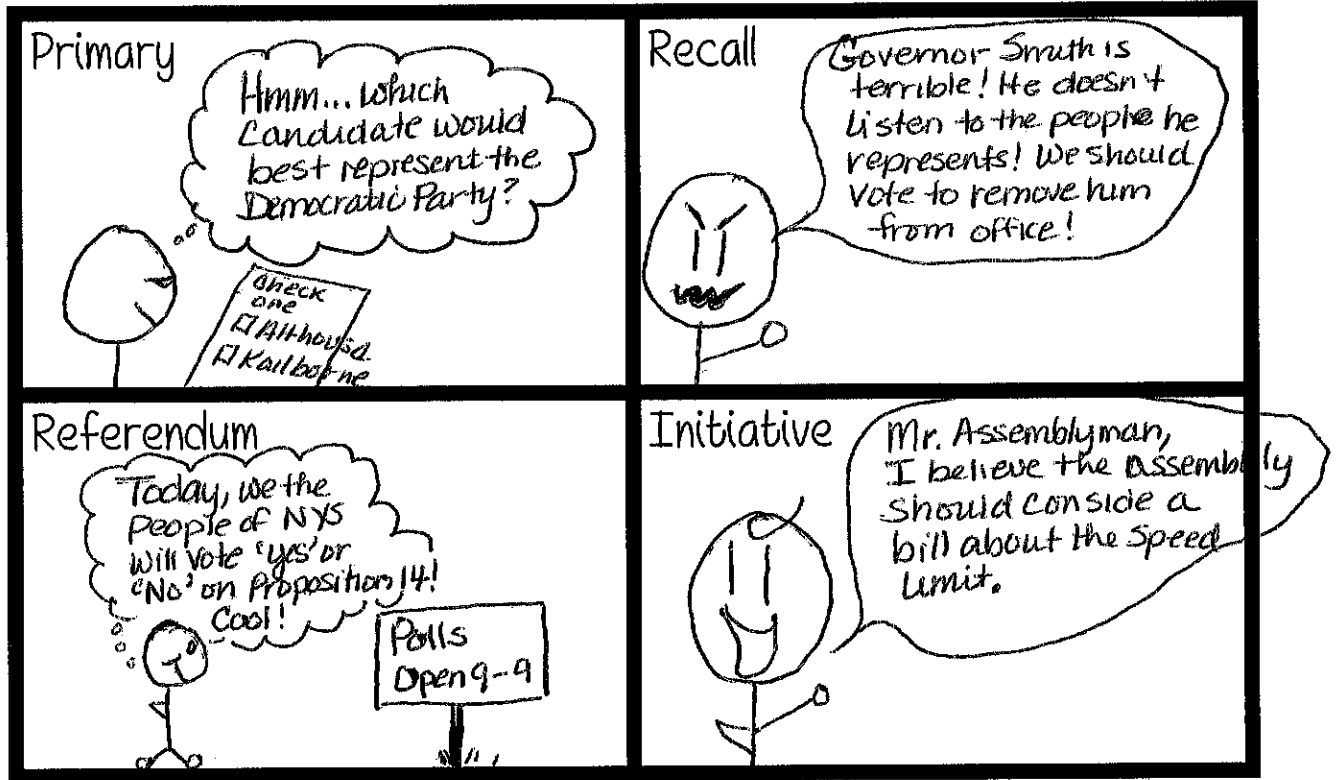
19th Amendment

Purpose: Women are granted the right to vote

Effect:

- 50% increase in # of American voters
- Candidates target women's issues to get votes
- Women can hold office
